### Mandeville and Wenlock, mascots of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Summer Games

According to the story, these two characters were made from the last drops of steel left over from the construction of the Olympic and Paralympic stadium.



Mandeville

Mandeville, the blue one, is named after Stoke Mandeville in Buckinghamshire, the birthplace of the Paralympic Games.



Mandeville's friend, Wenlock, is named after Much Wenlock in Shropshire where the Much Wenlock Games are still held. They were an inspiration for the modern Olympic Games.

Part of Korean culture and folklore. Asiatic Black Bears are – like the Paralympic athletes – strong, courageous and determined.





## Someity and Miraitowa, mascots of the Tokyo 2020 Paralympic and Olympic Summer Games



Someity's name comes from 'someiyoshino', a popular Japanese pink cherry blossom. In English the word sounds like 'so mighty'.



Miraitowa enjoys finding out about old things and learning new knowledge from them, mixing the old with the new.
